School Culture Update

Many of you will remember completing the School Culture Survey sent out in the latter half of the Autumn Term. We were grateful for the responses received from all stakeholder groups - pupils, teaching staff, support staff, governors and parents - 442 in all! This gave us a lot of data to sort through, but it was interesting that there were strong trends among the responses from different groups. This was great news - we all want the same things! We received a strong message from pupils, staff and parents that expectations are felt to be high in the classroom and regarding academic standards, but that there are some areas, for example during time away from lessons, where we could set ourselves even higher standards. Within lessons, there is a feeling from pupils and staff that relatively minor issues, such as lack of equipment or chattiness, should not take time away from the focussed teaching and learning environment we all seek. There was a general theme from all stakeholders that the roles and responsibilities of the Senior Leadership Team could be better understood and so work has begun to address this by talking more openly about who meets when, what is discussed and why—and this will continue in the future.



Emma wrote her letter of application for the post of Head Teacher on 5/11/15 – over 8 years later and at the end of last term we said 'goodbye' as she resettles in the Orkney Islands with her family to take on the role of Head of Papdale Primary School. In her letter she wrote: "I know that I have the leadership qualities to take the Dixie Infant and Junior School further on its journey." Emma was right, but she underestimated her own impact, which has been felt from 3-18. It is now common place for staff to work across phases and

for real collaboration between colleagues from 3-18 to the benefit of pupils at the Dixie. Emma instinctively understood the educational benefits of the 3-18 message and has consistently helped lead this cultural change. As a co-designer of and teacher in the Dixie 6 curriculum, Emma really has led by example.

As a previous Headteacher in the maintained sector, Emma has also had her own cultural change to manage – and she has led the same change in new colleagues. Very quickly, she instinctively understood the issues in play – the nuances of differences in approach in independent education – and this combined with her attention to detail (and love of risk assessment) will make her absence keenly felt by all. Most importantly for me, as a fellow member of the leadership team, Emma has been consistently and completely reliable, has overseen a complete overhaul of the Junior School curriculum and has managed the various pressures of her role magnificently.

I will very much miss working with her, and on behalf of us all, wish her every success as she embarks on yet another cultural change in the Orkneys!

From Emma Billington:

As I write this, I am sitting in my office at the Junior School and reflecting on just how lucky I have been to have worked here for the last 7 years. In September 2016, joining the Junior School as headteacher was the start of a new and exciting journey and as I finish that journey and get ready to head onto the next one, I feel both sadness and excitement in equal measure.

Reflecting on the last 7 years, there have been lots of changes at the Junior School. There is now a new curriculum and assessment system in all year groups; subjects are taught thematically and assessment is useful and informative. There is an excellent new music building, the Pippins house has been reorganised and extended, there is a new Reception building and EYFS outside area, a Playpod (which the children love and staff loathe!) iPads, trips in every year group (including Skern for surfing!) and links with the senior pupils are strong. But at Dixie the material and cosmetics aren't what lie at the heart of the school. In Dixie, every single child is valued and known - this is a strength at Dixie like no other I have seen and one which sets Dixie apart. Every child has a voice, every child is valued, cared for, challenged and supported to be their best version of themselves and to grab every moment and opportunity with excitement.

The previous years have also brought challenges - the years of Covid will never be forgotten. The memories of endless risk assessments and changing government guidelines, planning for bubbles and remote learning, all remind us of a very difficult time. But amidst those difficult times, the hard work, resilience and commitment of Dixie staff and the community was commendable. My own highlights and fondest memories were the road trips to visit all the children and deliver their books and reports. Connecting with the community again, keeping everyone apart but together as we gradually returned to normality was tough in a school where togetherness is key. I am so pleased those days have passed but also thankful and proud of the strength in adversity that everyone demonstrated.

The Junior School is a happy place. It is made happy by the children, staff and parents and by the care, time and generosity that everyone affords each other at Dixie. It is the one thing that struck me 7 years ago and continues to strike me today - at Dixie people care. Children are truly at the centre of every thought and decision. I love coming to school each day now, just as much as I did 7 years ago. I have learnt so much from the excellent support of governors and colleagues and I want to thank Richard Lynn and the governing body for offering me the opportunity of the role, almost 8 years ago. Thank you to everyone in the school community, not least the children, for placing Dixie as the highlight of my career so far. It hasn't just been a place of work, it has been an extension of my family and Max and Milo are equally sad to go. They have both had the best of starts in their school careers and will miss their friends and teachers and the warmth and guidance the school has provided.

The decision by the Governors and leadership to take their time to find any replacement is entirely the best strategy - I wish everyone the very best in the years to come and finally a big thank you to you all for everything you have given me and the imprint Dixie has left on me.

Governing Body - Chair of Finance




To take delegated responsibility on behalf of the Governing Body for overseeing all financial, facilities and people aspects of the School, working alongside the Headmaster, Head of the Junior School and the Bursar Consultant so as to ensure the School's short and long-term viability. It has a monitoring and advisory role relating to the school's financial health, accounting compliance, overview of Health and Safety, the HR function of the school, including staff establishment and appointment procedures, terms and conditions of employment, and levels of remuneration.

Anyone interested in this voluntary role would be working closely with the Headmaster, Bursar and Chair of Governors. All Governors are Trustees and subject to enhanced recruitment checks for safeguarding and management.

Dixie's Governing Body - A Source of Expertise, Strength and Support

The checks and balances which a wider team provides are vital for every organisation's health. There are twelve governors at the Dixie, each with their own specialisms, each with their own particular inputs in school life. Among them are educationalists, accountants, doctors, school inspectors, alumni and those with an interest in marketing or who run their own businesses. All are volunteers, dedicated to ensuring the very best for the Dixie: they do not stifle ambition for the future of the school, they encourage it. They do not stand in the way of investment, they look to make it possible and help to ensure that long term aims are well served by expenditure. They are involved in every area of the vibrant Dixie school life, continually helping to ensure that the core aims of the school are translated into daily reality for students at the Dixie. Some read with Junior School pupils, others are parents, all attend meetings, concerts, school events and take the time to talk to students; crucially, they all have oversight of the multi-faceted school development plan, an ambitious document with its focus on pupil personal development and achievement.

Dixie Governors understand their strategic role and its place in delivering excellence. The daily running of the school is delegated to me, but I am in regular contact with the Chair and Vice Chair of Governors in particular and never far from a meeting in which governors offer challenge and support in equal measure. Our meetings are effective and provide an open forum for discussion. For parents of children at the school the Dixie Governors should be a source of comfort - that the 'buck' doesn't stop with me and that the direction and future of the Dixie is assured. Proprietorial schools, and there are several in the immediate area, do not benefit from these checks and balances and as has unfortunately been seen with schools such as Manor House and Milverton House School, they are by their nature less secure – vulnerable to the whim of the owner. The Dixie's business model as a Charity, with Governors as trustees, overseen by the Charity Commission is far better suited to the current environment as any surplus only goes back as investment into the school, with no return necessary to any shareholder or owner. I am proud to have the backing – support and challenge - of such a diverse, supportive and talented group as the Dixie Governors.

Students were able to view their operations and ask Rebecca Davies (Managing Director) and her team about how she runs a multi-award winning business. BBC News Reporter visit—by Kianna Naik, Year 6

On Friday the 24th of March, Mrs Houldcroft, a BBC news reporter came to visit Year 6. She was invited to talk to us as part of our unit of work on Journalism. During her visit, talked to us about what she does, how hard it is, what you need to know and much more. She gave us tips, for example to be a journalist you need to be quick on your feet and you need to have a good memory. The reason being is that you could be in one place and then 10 minutes later you get a call saying you need to be somewhere else! You stop what you are doing and go! Once you get there you might have 5 minutes to get your facts and then you go live on air! Mrs Houldcroft told us about different stories that she has covered including both happy and dark content; the teachers' strikes, prison stories, police raids, Covid and even the disappearance of Madeleine McCann.

Our visitor talked to us about how to present your work (e.g. don't just stand there, use things around you to help tell the story.) Mrs Houldcroft told us that when presenting you need to stay on subject, be clear and speak three words per second.

Safeguarding—from Mrs Banton

Like all aspects of our lives, going online can conjure up a wide range of emotions and responses that can impact our mood and well-being. Whilst we know that going online can for the most part be fun, enjoyable and educational, there are times when young people can feel upset, left out or simply not good enough. Digital resilience gives children and young people the ability to recognise when being online is having a negative impact on their well-being and the strategies to help themselves to bounce back and recover from setbacks. It also gives young people the tools to help their peers if they are having a challenging time online and know that there is a network of people to whom they can turn.

Childnet have adapted digital resilience tips published by Mind to help young people:

BUILD A SUPPORT NETWORK

- Reach out to someone and support others too. A problem shared is a problem halved
- Find useful sites or organisations who can help

GIVE YOURSELF A BREAK

- You are not perfect and will make mistakes. Be kind and fair to yourself
- Take some time offline if you want to
- Sort out disagreements quickly

LIFESTYLE CHANGES

- Make time for the things and people that make you happy
- Look out for new challenges
- Life can be hectic. Find ways to help you relax

PHYSICAL HEALTH

- Get some exercise, be active
- Put your devices away at night to get a good night's sleep
- Eat regularly and healthily

As adults we also have a responsibility to help the young people in our lives to develop their own ways to manage risk and recover from mistakes and challenging situations as well as adapt to the situations they face. Equally, modelling how young people should engage with others around them is just as important in the digital world.

A strong home school partnership is of central importance in ensuring pupils succeed and we are always grateful when concerns are communicated early by parents to school. We regularly remind pupils that when things go wrong, it is important that where possible parents are not the first to hear—we will continue to do all we can to ensure that student voice is heard in school. As parents, you will be aware that sometimes what you hear about events in school is not necessarily completely accurate—if you hear something which does not sound right or if you have any concern, please make contact with school in the first instance.

Exams

The Summer Term sees all senior school students preparing for and completing written exams. Our GCSE and A Level candidates are already embroiled in the build up to these external exams and are expected to dedicate a significant proportion of the holidays to exam preparation, whilst managing of course to get some break from academic studies. Holiday revision days in some subjects are arranged and revision classes will resume in earnest after the break. As with other aspects of maturity we recognise that students don't automatically know how to prepare for GCSE exams, how to manage their holiday time vs revision or even how to revise. At the Dixie we have a carefully staged programme of exam preparation:

Year 6 - Sit exams in most but not all of their subjects using teacher prepared summary notes. These are open book exams with the emphasis on showing understanding of the material covered rather than memorising information.

Year 7 - sit exams in all their subjects using self prepared revision materials. Again these are open book exams but students are expected to be developing the skills necessary to identify key information, summarise topics etc. Students are expected to bring in a few specifically designed revision sheets; they are not allowed simply to sit the exam with their text or exercise book in front of them!

Year 8+ - By now students are expected to be developing the skills of note-taking and revision and will be examined without access to additional resources.

All the exams for Years 6-9 are completed week commencing 22 May leaving the half term holiday for relaxation and family time. Year 10 and Lower Sixth Form pupils will complete exams during a two week period starting 15 May. Students in Years 6-9 are not expected to revise over the Easter holiday but would be wise to ensure that all their notes are up to date and organised - this leaves plenty of time in class to ask about any areas in need of development.

Study Leave for Year 11 starts Monday 15 May (last day in school Fri 12 May) and for Upper Sixth starts Monday 5 June (last day in school 26 May). Timetabled lessons for Upper Sixth Form pupils will continue until Friday 26 May, to cover revision material but sessions become optional once A level exams begin.

Please ensure your child's cashless catering account is in credit. After the Easter break students with overdrawn accounts will not be able to purchase breaktime snacks. Please be assured we will never allow a student to go hungry at lunchtime but the additional administration of issuing breaktime snacks where students do not have sufficient funds is causing significant delay to the service and resulting in some students missing out on their purchase.

Enrichment Update — Senior School

During the spring term **Year 6** were placed into small ensemble groups and created their own music groups. They were tasked with creating a brand identity and preparing some pieces to record just before Easter. Pupils have also had the opportunity as a group to contribute to the intergenerational care programme and have put forward some ideas for the Bosworth in Bloom display at the front of school. In the Summer term Year 6 will complete some outdoor map skills work.

Year 7 have been participating in DOSE activities during the Spring term. In the Summer term we are offering the opportunity for all pupils to achieve a Blue Peter badge which then allows free entry to over 200 attractions.

Year 8 have completed two projects during the Spring term creating a series of Snow leopard newspapers and then designing and making some sustainable fashion. In the Summer term they will have an opportunity to continue to build skills they have been developing in DOSE.

Year 9 continue to work towards the criteria for the Bronze D of E and have been completing volunteering work by litter picking in the local area, learning outdoor cooking skills as their skill and completing the physical activity component through participation in dodgeball. Recently pupils have developed map skills needed for their expedition, including taking bearings. In the Summer term the Year 9 pupils will complete the specific training required to complete their practice and final expeditions including pitching and packing tents and the art of how to pack a rucksack to carry over distance.

Pupils in **Year 10 to the Lower Sixth** have had the opportunity to participate in a range of activities such as learning British sign language, game design, Extended project qualification, mock trial, car maintenance and participation in a range of business competitions. In addition there have been opportunities for year group debates for Year 11 and the Sixth Form and chances for pupils to support younger pupils with DOSE.

In the summer term **Year 11** and **Upper Sixth** pupils will be designated private study time during enrichment and should arrive at school prepared to make best use of the time available. Year 11 will be working independently and will need to bring books, revision notes and chromebooks to each session, they should add the 1 hour 45 minutes of enrichment to their current revision timetables.




Photographic Competition
