This half term has been unusually short, but we have done our best to squeeze the proverbial quart into a pint pot! Significantly, we also celebrated the return of the German Exchange trip abroad forty senior students enjoyed a spectacular week immersed in German culture. I was delighted to receive this email from Mrs Till, Head of German on their return:

I am so proud of the students. Every single one of them was so brave to take part and I have heard so many kind and flattering comments about them from their German hosts. They did Dixie proud!"

### **Parent Briefings and Dixie Culture**

We were delighted to see so many for our briefings at the end of September events we intend to add to our calendar at the start of every academic year. Culture in any organisation can be defined as "the way we do things around here." Last year, we embarked on a project as a school to define what that means for us here at the Dixie. We see our school community as encompassing not just pupils and teaching staff, but support staff, catering & facilities teams, finance, Governors and parents and it was important that everyone had their say. Surveys were completed during the Autumn Term and the work then began to take that feedback and use it to define our aims and values. At the end of the process, we define our main aim as "fulfilling potential through aspiration and integrity" and we talk in school about pursuing success through challenge, consistency & high expectations. Underpinning that aim are our core values of respect, resilience, courage, commitment and care and it is these values that are forming the basis of many of our conversations in school this year. We have devised a document that puts more detail behind each of these and is our attempt to define what each value looks like in practice. This is displayed in all classrooms and is also printed in the student planner, so please do take a look and talk about it with your child. This current year is about embedding these values, so we are focusing on them one at a time, reinforcing each one through assemblies, form time activities and PSD lessons. We hope that your children have already spoken about this at home, but please do engage with them in conversation and we hope that you will join us in trying to put these core values at the heart of all we do as a school. 1 | Page



### Safeguarding—from Mrs Banton

Games consoles and video games bring many benefits to children and young people including improved levels of concentration, creativity and memory as well as helping to develop important teamwork and language skills. Gaming can, however, also be quite addictive and distracting and consume a large amount of an individual's time.

If your child has a games console, it is important that as a parent, you have set up age appropriate parental controls. The controls will vary across the different consoles but will allow you as a parent to restrict spending and communication.

PlayStation – you can set up your account as a family manager and create a separate child account so you can tailor their online experience. Further information for parents on keeping children safe online whilst using PlayStation Network can be found here.

**Xbox** – the Family Settings app allows parents to manage their child's gaming activities not only on Xbox consoles but also on iOS and Android phones details of which can be found here.

Nintendo Switch – also offer a free app to allow you to monitor what your children are playing and their gameplay time as well as giving you the facility to restrict your child's gaming access. You can find out more about the app here.

If your child is playing online, please be aware that some games, such as FIFA and Fortnite, allow communication and depending on the game, this could be through in-game text chat, direct messages or talking through headphones. Please make sure that settings appropriate to your child are set up for the games that they play.

It can be difficult for children and young people to moderate online chat so please do take steps to ensure that your child knows how to block and report inappropriate behaviour or behaviour that makes them feel uncomfortable whilst online as well as knowing to talk to you or a trusted adult if they have any concerns, however small.

If you find yourself in a situation where your child is wanting to play a game, check that they are old enough. UK Safer Internet Centre have recently published a blog which offers practical tips to parents for what to do if your child talks to you about playing a new game. The NSPCC also provide further guidance and support regarding online games.

September saw 18 of our new Lower Sixth elect to train as Peer Mentors. This involves a whole day of training from our School Listener Alex Buttery. Alex has a wealth of experience both in counselling and training roles and has been running our Peer Mentoring training for a number of years. We were delighted when she declared this cohort "the most engaged group ever". The training requires students to explore listening skills, the difference between empathy and sympathy and considers body language. The issue of boundaries and when to pass information on are discussed in detail and students are given advice on how to look after themselves as well as others. We are enormously proud of our peer mentors, many of whom have already been deployed to support younger students. The support they offer is varied; it might be meeting regularly to touch base with someone struggling to settle, or supporting a student with some academic worries or perhaps accompanying someone to a co curricular club for the first few times. Our 6th formers both enjoyed and valued the experience: The work our peer mentors do is invaluable and we are most grateful for the additional strand to our pastoral care. 2 | Page
